The meeting closed

3. Public discussion

15 minutes allowed

- a. Footpath on river bank needs a cut as it is not walk able – the Chairman informed the meeting it is cut three times a year.
It was agreed a letter would be sent to the BA asking them to reconsider the programme of cutting and that it is cut 3 times a year and only when it is overgrown
- b. Collis Lane highway has a burnt patch where a vehicle caught fire – the Chairman informed the meeting the PC had notified Hemsby PC of the matter as that part of Collis Lane is in their parish.
The meeting was informed HPC are sending a chasing email to NCC requesting repair works to be carried out.
- c. Martham Road/Hemsby Road leaning telegraph pole – the parishioner advised with it leaning it could cause an obstruction to buses and other tall vehicles – it was left with NCCllr Hanton to deal with.
- d. Cottage Road potholes in the highway
It was reported there are several on the edge of the highway – it was agreed an email would be sent to NCC asking them to carry out repairs.

4. Report from Borough Councillors/County Councillor – if present

CCllr Hanton reported

- a. NCC consultation - Great Yarmouth third river crossing consultation –
People will have the opportunity to give their thoughts on more detailed proposals for Great Yarmouth's Third River Crossing when Norfolk County Council launches a public consultation later this month.

Construction of the new lifting bridge over the River Yare is due to begin in late 2020 and would see a bridge built linking the A47 at Harfrey's Roundabout on the western side of the river to South Denes Road on the eastern side of the river.

Ahead of the consultation launching on Monday, 20 August, the County Council has now revealed further detail on the design of the bridge and its approaches, how it proposes to operate the bridge and its likely effects on traffic in the town.

Details made public for the first time include:

- Designs for the approaches to the bridge on either side. A new five-arm roundabout would be created on the western side of the river and a dual carriageway road would link Harfrey's roundabout to the new roundabout and then continue onto the bridge and over the river to meet South Denes Road at a traffic-light controlled junction.
- Information regarding the opening function of the bridge. It is estimated that the bridge would be available for use by road traffic for 22 hours and 38 minutes a day. Openings to allow taller vessels through would take around five and a half minutes each time at an average of 15 openings a day based on anticipated river traffic levels in 2023.
- Traffic modeling, forecasting how traffic would use the Third River Crossing and get around the rest of the town as a result. This shows that the new bridge would be anticipated to carry 19,400 vehicles a day in 2023, rising to 21,700 in 2038.
- The provision of cycling and walking routes. A number of dedicated and shared use walking and cycling routes are proposed around the Third River Crossing, with pavements and an off-carriageway cycling route provided on the bridge itself.

Clr Martin Wilby, Chairman of Norfolk County Council's Environment, Development and Transport Committee, said: "The Third River Crossing is important to Great Yarmouth and

the whole of Norfolk. Not only will it reduce traffic congestion on the town's roads but, in doing so, it will help to attract investment to the area, supporting business growth and creating jobs.

"This is likely to be people's last chance to give us their thoughts on proposals for the bridge through a public consultation, so I would encourage everyone to get involved."

The consultation will run between Monday, 20 August and Friday, 5 October and during this time people will be able to view information on the design, operation and likely impact of the bridge and respond via www.norfolk.gov.uk/3rc.

Staffed consultation events are also being held where people can ask questions of staff involved in the project and respond to the consultation in person. The details of these are as follows:

In November 2017 Norfolk County Council was awarded £98 million towards the anticipated £120 million cost of building the Third River Crossing by the Department for Transport. Then in February the Secretary of State for Transport confirmed the Third River Crossing as a nationally significant project.

As a result, Norfolk County Council needs to make an application for a Development Consent Order (DCO), which combines planning permission, land and other necessary orders, to progress the project. This application is due to be made in spring 2019 but before it can do so, the council is required to carry out a statutory public consultation to obtain people's views on the proposals.

The council is also currently in the middle of a competitive selection process to appoint a main contractor to design and build the Third River Crossing, with the successful contractor due to be announced in early 2019.

Cllr Graham Plant, Leader of Great Yarmouth Borough Council, said: 'The Third River Crossing is a major piece in the puzzle in realizing Great Yarmouth's enormous potential, particularly in supporting the growth of the port, outer harbor and energy-related enterprise zone, which is why the project was awarded £98 million by the Government in last year's Autumn Budget.'

"The benefits of this bridge for our residents, businesses and visitors are significant, and I'm really pleased to see that the project is making good progress and is on schedule to start construction in late 2020."

b. Winterton Primary School & Nursery possible closure

Norfolk County Council proposed to close Winterton Primary & Nursery School (Foundation), with effect from 31st December 2018 and to extend the catchment area of Hemsby Primary School (Community), to accommodate the change.

They consulted on that proposal as a request from the Interim Executive Board of the school on the 16th May 2018

This consultation closed on the 24th July 2018

Following this consultation, Halesworth-based Consortium Multi Academy Trust (C.M.A.T.) agreed in principal for the school to become part of it and the Regional Schools Commissioner agreed for it to be discussed by a Headteachers Board on the 23rd August 2018.

On that date the Headteacher Board agreed that C.M.A.T could continue with their proposal to include Winterton within their Trust.

As such, they have now engaged in the due diligence process, which will be undertaken in the coming months.

Sarah Tough, the Executive Director of Children's Services, will make the final decision on this matter and she has now deferred that decision until the due diligence process is completed.

Due to the uncertainty surrounding the schools future, some parents had made bids for other school placements for their children.

The aspiration is that those parents would now return their children to the school to boost the school population to ensure a practical outcome.

This number is 40 pupils.

An informal parent's meeting was held at the school on the 3rd September 2018 and a formal consultation meeting is scheduled to be held on the 18th September 2018.

- c. Norfolk Fire & Rescue Service
The Norfolk Police and Crime Commissioner (P.C.C.), relying on a power introduced by the Policing and Crime Act 2017, is proposing a change of governance for Norfolk Fire and Rescue Service.

This proposal would see the Fire and Rescue Service transfer from the County Council to be governed by a new Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner.

The P.C.C. has published a detailed case for change setting out this proposal and started the associated statutory public consultation on the 11th July 2018.

This eight-week consultation expired on the 5th September 2018

The P.C.C. has not yet decided whether to submit a case for change to the Home Secretary for consideration and he will make that decision once he has considered the feedback and views submitted during the consultation.

The P.C.C.'s proposal is that:

'It is proposed that Norfolk should adopt a new governance model for Norfolk Fire and Rescue Service (N.F.R.S.).

There are significant benefits in terms of improving public safety and making efficient use of resources. It will also provide a new level of financial and strategic independence for N.F.R.S. by moving it out of the control of Norfolk County Council and giving the service control of its' own finances.

Closer collaboration has the potential to unlock over 10m worth of financial efficiencies over the next 10 years.

The intention is to enable the Chief Officers to re-invest in the service, people, training and development, as well as offering financial resilience for the future and covering any costs of transition.'

Norfolk County Council are strongly opposed to this proposal.

The opinions expressed include:

Removing the Fire and Rescue Service from the County Council presents a significant financial risk to the Service and therefore a risk to public safety.

The claimed £10 efficiency figure is speculative and misleading.

The claimed benefits could be achieved without a change of governance and without the associated cost of disruption.

As a statutory consultee, Norfolk County Council will submit their detailed response to the P.C.C.'s Office.

Further, that they will be writing to the Home Secretary direct to express their views.

- d. County Councillor funding to be distributed within his Ward. This year there is £6k if there is anything the parish would like consider please let him know.

7. Matters arising

To report on matters arising from the Minutes if not already on the Agenda for information only.

a. Horsey Road

NCC has advised the works have been programmed for repair, however this road is traffic sensitive and during the main tourist season which ends 30 Sept NCC refrains from doing anything but emergency work so the work will be carried out after that date.

b. Staithe Road highway

Email from NCC has advised they have looked at the area several times and cannot see any standing water on the highway. The meeting was advised during the long dry spell there hadn't been a problem. It was agreed a reply be sent asking for a new drainage system be installed.

c. Dark Lane corner

The Chairman reported the ditch has been cleaned out by NCC

d. Sandy Lane pot hole

NCC has programmed this work together with other edge damage along this section.

e. Dead tree outside Grailee

PCllr Jones declared a personal interest as his son lives at this property.

NCC has emailed stating the tree is not sited on NCC land so it is the property owners responsibility to maintain the tree.

PCllr Jones advised the meeting the Police as an emergency instructed NCC Highways to cut down the tree and his son has received an Invoice for this work for over £1k.

This matter is left with the family to deal with.

f. The Street footpath ditch

The meeting was advised Burnley Hall are not going to fill in the ditch as it would entail a great deal of work, they will repair the fence and approach a neighbour with a view to them cutting their hedge back

g. Permissive footpath

Low Road – chasing email sent to WPC, they haven't had a reply so they are chasing NCC, WPC have forwarded an email from NCC which states there are a number of properties have vehicular access along this byway and they would be responsible for repairs to the surface. There is no drainage system along this route so it would require a major scheme which in the current climate is unlikely to take place.

h. Landfill sites in the parish of Somerton

GYBC Dev Control Manager was emailed and he sent a link into the Norfolk Mineral & Waste site documentation. He advised on checking the document he could not see any proposed or sites for allocation in the parish of Somerton

i. Highway definition

A parishioners query concerning what is the definition of a highway. It was agreed a reply would be sent advising a highway is a public right of way, road, footpath and bridleway.

8. Council House (3 Horsey Road)

a) Update on information received from BC regarding repairs

The Chairman reported:

The Parish Council has to rely on the Borough Council since it is their property and their responsibility.

The property is the last remaining Council house in Somerton. The Parish Council has voiced our concerns and wishes to the Borough Council that the property is refurbished and continues to remain in Borough ownership.

Email from GYBC Officer states:

For clarification we are in a process with our development company Equinox Enterprises to evaluate the above site this includes considering the best opportunities for the plot whether this be simple refurbishment, refurbishment and any redevelopment opportunities to build a new property within the site or to evaluate whether the property is beyond reasonable repair for the Council and to consider onward sale. As explained this has taken significantly longer than anticipated and they are still awaiting the report from our Agent.

The property has been vacant for some time and is therefore a priority in relation to identifying a solution, once the information is available this will be considered by the Housing and Neighbourhoods Committee, hopefully next week.

BCllr Bensly checked on his iPad to see if this Council House is on the Agenda for the next committee meeting, but it was not on the BC website. BCllr Bensly will advise the PC when it is on the website.

Meeting closed so that the public could participate

Members of the public passed the following comments:

1. It is outrageous how long this property has been empty and the fabric of the building will have deteriorated and there is an adjoining privately owned property which could be affected.
 2. Is it possible to find out how many empty council houses there are in the borough – the BCllr advised there are a number that have also been empty for a number of years.
 3. It was agreed if the Report doesn't go to the Housing & Neighbourhood Committee meeting next week the PC will get the press involved. An email is to be sent to the GYBC Officer giving this information.
- b) Proposal that the BC considers the involvement of the local Community Land Trust in future plans for 3 Horsey Road

After discussions PCllr Jones proposed CLT should be involved with any future plans, seconded PCllr Clift, all in agreement.

BCllr Galer stated as a CLT trustee the East Flegg CLT area will take around 3 months to implement.

9. Agree the dates for the Autumn litter pick of roadside verges

After discussions it was agreed parishioners litter pick will take place on 6 & 7 October 2018. The Chairman reminded parishioners carrying out this as volunteers and at your own risk. All those who carry out the litter pick had been given a Risk Assessment as guidance and to follow.

GYBS are to be requested to collect the bagged up rubbish from the Chairmans property.

10. Overgrown hedges

a. The meeting was advised NCC Officers have visited the parish and cannot find any that are causing a problem.

b. Procedures for getting any overgrown hedges cut back

If anyone has a problem with an overgrown hedge it was suggested they advise the property owner/occupier of the problem. If there is no response then to contact the PC who will then email NCC to get the hedge cut back.

11. Great Yarmouth Borough Council Local Plan

To agree response to the consultation, the consultation period is from 20 August to 30 Sept.

The Chairman reported he had read the documentation and he suggested the following response to be sent to GYBC:

Somerton Parish Council considers that present policies have failed to deliver the much needed affordable housing especially in rural areas. There is also no mention on the implications of second homes. Has any study been carried out on the number of second/holiday homes in the Borough and in particular in the villages?

We also request that the draft local plan includes a commitment / policy for the provision of affordable housing as follows;

"The Borough Council will support and, where possible, provide assistance to a Community Land Trust or similar body in the retention or delivery of community assets (such as public spaces and buildings, affordable housing) for local benefit with significant weight to be attributed in rural locations. This will include partnership working to provide for acquisitions of land and buildings, construction projects to include building of affordable housing and also the management of existing assets"

PCllr Clift proposed this response be the one from SPC, seconded PCllr Barker, all in agreement.

BCllr Galer reported Hemsby & Winterton are using a private planning consultant from Norwich. They are looking into one large PA in Hemsby, with Winterton a large area of land. The cost is £500 per day so this could be something possibly for Somerton to consider, the Chairman advised Somerton has very few properties in the parish unlike Hemsby to absorb this type of cost.

12. Broads Authority matters including Broads Forum

The Chairman to report

a. Conservation Area

Their Conservation Officer has advised that with his current workload he might not have prepared everything to go to Committee on the 14 Sept if not it will go to Committee on the 12 October.

Whats new

Hear about the latest plans and activities in the Broads, including the Hickling restoration project, priorities for recreational access, the upcoming review of England's designated landscapes and the work of the Broads Authority Rangers.

Parish Matters

Talk to Broads Authority staff and members about the important issues for your local communities.

The Chairman stated that the 4 yearly Broads Forum meetings were being replaced by 2 workshop style meetings which means that no agenda items could be raised and attendees are expected to sit and listen to Broads Authority presentations.

2. PCllr Barker stated he was the representative for the northern parishes and he was the only person for the parishes that ever attended, there were no Mins or notes of the meetings so he felt there was no point in attending.

3. The last Broads Parish Forum meeting invitees attended to find out the meeting had been cancelled, they were advised by the BA it was too late to let anyone know of the cancellation.

4. The PC had asked for the Broads Parish Forum meetings to be held in the north and then southern parishes on a six monthly basis, however this was dismissed.

It was agreed a letter would be sent to Lord Gardiner, prepared by the Chairman expressing the PC disappointment.

The Chairman reported he had spoken to the Leader of GYBC concerning the number of BCllr changes on the BA representing the borough and he had been advised a replacement should be in place in the very near future.

15. Somerton Water Level Review :

Update of stakeholders meeting held at Hickling on 29th August 18 to discuss OHES report. R.Starling. Somerton Water Management Review and Habitats Regulation Assessment: Stakeholder Engagement Meeting

Wednesday 29th August 2018, 1300hrs. Hickling Barn.

History;

The Broads Drainage Board commissioned OHES Environmental to provide a Habitat Regulations Assessment of two scenarios;

1. Water Levels are maintained at their current level.

2. Water levels are lowered by approx. 0.5m, in order to assist arable farming in the area.

The area being all the land to the east of Martham Broad which is drained by Somerton North and Somerton South Pumps.

The Chairman of the Parish Council attended the meeting and declared my interest as a reed & sedge cutter working at Martham Broad and that I was attending as a member of Somerton Parish Council.

The report mentions the detailed land level information which shows that land subsidence has occurred particularly where peat is at the surface. The soil data demonstrates that the Somerton district has complex interactions occurring within and between the soil zones such as the presence of sulphidic silts and brackish water within the clay and acidic groundwater within the peat.

The report also mentions on page 3 that all this presents a very challenging environment where water level management can have significant effects on water quality through iron concentrations, acidity, salinity and turbidity.

It recommends that under the precautionary principal, further measures are taken to improve water quality. Dropping the water table by approx. 0.5m would have significant consequences across multiple parts of the district through ochre release, brackish water inputs and land level fall. The report mentions that a significant part of the problem of surface water pooling is due to the presence of low permeability soils and compaction.

The report states that "It is therefore recommended that no water level reductions take place until it can be shown that mitigation measures would be sufficient to counteract the additional poor water quality generated."

This report will be going to the IDB meeting in October 2018

PCllr Jones proposed a letter to be sent to the Broads IDB supporting this report, seconded PCllr Clift, all in agreement.

16. Elections of Staithe & Poors trustees

PCllr Jones declared a personal interest in the Poors trustees as he is a member

PCllr Clift & PCllr Barker declared a personal interest in the Staithe trustees and took no part in the discussion or decision. The trustees of both Committees have advised the people interested in taking this role

PCllr Clift proposed the nominees should be appointed, seconded PCllr Barker, all in agreement

PCllr Jones proposed the nominees should be appointed, seconded PCllr Starling, all in agreement.
